WHAT IS HIV?

Human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) is a viral infection that attacks the immune system CD4 T-cells in the human body. This leads to progressive deterioration of the immune system.

HIV is spread through bodily fluids:


- Blood
- Semen or vaginal secretions
- Breastmilk

If not treated or treatment failure occurs, progressive disease can also lead to more serious complications including acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS).

WHAT IS PrEP?

Pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) is a daily medication **used to protect HIV negative people** from unknowingly getting an HIV infection.

When taken every day, PrEP is **safe and highly effective** in preventing HIV infection. PrEP is even more effective if it is combined with other ways to prevent new HIV infections such as:

- condom use
- drug use treatment
- treatment for HIV positive partners

PrEP reduces the risk of getting HIV from sex by more than 90% and from intravenous drug use, or injecting of drugs, by more than 70% when used consistently.

WHO SHOULD RECEIVE PrEP?

PrEP has been approved for adults and adolescents (> 77 lbs.) who DO NOT currently have HIV...BUT are at High Risk of being exposed to HIV.

High Risk includes:

- People who have an HIV positive sexual partner
- People whose sexual partner is an injection-drug user
- People who are injection-drug users using dirty or shared needles
- People who works at an injection-drug treatment center
- People undergoing injection-drug treatment in the past 6 months

If you think you should be taking PrEP, contact a PrEP prescribing health care provider so that they can:

- 1. Test for HIV including acute infection
- 2. Order recommended tests needed prior to PrEP initiation
- 3. Help you apply for insurance or medication assistance programs
- 4. Prescribe your PrEP therapy
- 5. Follow-up every 3 months with appropriate monitoring

Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP) can protect against HIV infection when used daily as prescribed.

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WHAT DO I TAKE FOR PrEP THERAPY?

PrEP therapy includes taking either **Truvada** (Emtricitabine 200 mg/ Tenofovir disoproxil fumarate 300 mg) or **Descovy** (Emtricitabine 200 mg/ Tenofovir alafenamide 25 mg), which are taken both taken **once daily**, and monitored by a healthcare provider every three months.

- Onset of Effect: 7 20 days
- **Side Effects:**
 - O Headache
 - Upset stomach
 - O Loss of appetite
- Contraindications: Not indicated in patients with unknown or positive HIV status. Ask your doctor if you have impaired kidney function, especially with the use of Truvada. Descovy may be a better option for you.

PrEP is much LESS effective if not taken every day, and Bremo Pharmacy has a synchronization service to help you handle all of your daily medications at the same time along with your **PrEP** therapy.

WHERE CAN I GET PrEP?


